Evictions/Foreclosures

HUD

- Suspended evictions until May 1
- Impacts FHA, FHFA, Fannie Mae, Freddie Mac

USDA

- Single-family housing Direct and Guaranteed loans
- 60-day moratorium on foreclosures/evictions
- 6-month deferment

- Must contact to reconnect
- Disconnection notices still sent



COVID-19 Stimulus - Three Laws

- CPRSAA (H.R. 6074) signed March 6, 2020
- Families First Coronavirus Response Act (H.R. 6201) signed March 18, 2020
- CARES Act (H.R. 748) signed March 27, 2020



Employer-Paid Leave

- Paid sick leave two weeks (up to 80 hours)
 - Regular rate of pay if quarantined, and/or symptomatic and seeking medical diagnosis up to \$511 per day
 - 2/3 regular rate of pay if they are a caregiver of quarantined individual or care for a child up to \$200/day
- Paid expanded family and medical leave 12 weeks
 - 2/3 regular rate of pay up to **\$200** per day \$10,000 limit



Covered Employers?

- Public employers (unless covered by Title II of Family Medical Leave Act)
- Private employers with 500 or less employees

Exempt Employers

Small businesses (fewer than <u>50 employees</u>)

Businesses receive a Tax Credit for these payments


Self-employed individuals also qualify



Employees qualify for sick time if unable to work or telework because employee is:

- Subject to Federal, State, or local quarantine or isolation order (non-essential businesses)
- Advised by health care provider to self-quarantine
- Caring for individual subject to the above
- Caring for a child whose school or place of care is closed
- Experiencing other substantially-similar condition specific by Secretary of Health and Human Services

Unemployment

Mass-layoff number 2000180

Extension from 26 weeks to 39 weeks

Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation

- Additional \$600 per week
- Qualifiers
 - Tipped employees
 - Gig, self-employed without pay records
 - Social assistance programs
 - Language barriers
 - Seasonal, temporary and intermittently employed
 - Previously exhausted benefits STILL QUALIFY

Unemployment Expansion

	Weekly	Annualized Equivalent
Unemployment Minimum	\$134	\$6,968
CARES Act Benefit	\$600	\$31,000
Total	\$734	\$38,168



Individual Direct Payment

Adults (with AGI < \$75,000) receive \$1,200

- Phases out between \$75,000-\$99,000
- Married, head of household phaseout from \$112,500 to \$146,500

Each child/dependent in household gets \$500

Payments begin in mid-April?

Use payment & income data from 2019 or 2018 tax return



Individual Direct Payment

Getting a check?

- Use payment method and address from latest tax return
- Haven't filed taxes recently? Use Form <u>SSA-1099</u> or Form RRB-1099
- Not required to file or are not eligible for SSI
 - Will need to file simple tax return
 - Update not yet available at irs.gov



- Food and Nutrition Service
 - \$500 million supplemental WIC
 - Funding <u>increased</u> EBT for children missing school meals
 - The Emergency Food Assistance Program (<u>TEFAP</u>)
 - \$400 million for food banks
- Senior Nutrition Program, \$250 million
 - Meals for home-bound, disabled, chronically ill, caregivers
- SNAP requirements loosened



CARES ACT Overview

Low Income <u>Home Energy Assistance Program</u> (HEAP)

- \$900 million in grants
- Immediate home energy assistance low income

Community Services Block Grant

- \$1 billion in grants
- Social services and emergency assistance

Family Violence Prevention and Services

- \$45 million to violence shelters
- \$2 million to National Domestic Violence Hotline

CARES Act – Future!

HUD – CDBG - \$5 Billion (\$2 Billion by formula)

USDA Rural Development - \$145.5 Million

Administration for Children and Families - \$6.3 Billion

- Child Care and Development Block Grant \$3.5
 Billion
- Child Welfare Services \$45 million
- Runaway/Homeless Youth Programs \$25 million
- Head Start \$750 million
- Summer Programming \$500 million

National Endowment for the Arts - \$150 Million

Changes to Charitable Contributions

- Typically only deductible if itemize
- CARES Act allows \$300 above-the-line deduction
- Can take this deduction and standard deduction without itemizing
- Changes limitation on qualified contribution from 60% to 100% AGI in 2020



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
